# Course Description

This course builds on UIC's core urban strengths and addresses a critical priority for cities today. US / UPP 130 Principles of Urban Sustainability course introduces student to fundamental principles, interdisciplinary approaches, historical trends, policies and planning programs that promote sustainability in urban regions.
